

What is bullying?

Bullying behavior is repeated, or has the potential to be repeated, over time. Both kids who are bullied and who bully others may have serious, lasting problems. In order to be considered bullying, the behavior must be aggressive and include:

- An Imbalance of Power: Kids who bully use their power—such as physical strength, access to embarrassing information, or popularity—to control or harm others. Power imbalances can change over time and in different situations, even if they involve the same people.
- Repetition: Bullying behaviors happen more than once or have the potential to happen more than once.

Bullying includes actions such as making threats, spreading rumors, attacking someone physically or verbally, and excluding someone from a group on purpose.

This is why The Evolve Project was formed to raise awareness and empower the anti-bullying movement."

After several years as school resource officer, I have seen *a lot* of assemblies, particularly antibullying presentations, and many of them seem the same. The Evolve Project, however, stood out in a crowded field.

On September 16, 2013, Target, Inc. sponsored "The Evolve Project" anti-bullying workshop/ program for the student body of Antioch Middle School. Executive Director Cleta Paige-Cain came with her equipment, staff and performers. She delivered a highly professional, well-designed program. The program had a powerful introduction so that students were given an understanding of the goals and objectives of the program.

From the comments I have received from staff and students, the first impressions were made when the students saw the sound system, the screen, and the live musician on the keyboard. We all knew something powerful was about to happen and it more certainly did. The presentation was designed to hold the attention of our students. Mrs. Paige-Cain served as the narrator; and along with a PowerPoint, she very articulately explained bullying, how it occurs, places where it happens, the roles that people play in the bullying circle, the damage that bullying can do to a person's self-esteem, and what students should do when they are bullied or when they see others being bullied. She also spent some time talking about the dangers of cyber-bullying. Students were told how to report bullying incidents and to whom they should report these incidents.

In addition to the PowerPoint, it appeared as though Mrs. Paige-Cain knew exactly when students were ready for the next segment. Interwoven throughout the presentation were performers, singers or the dancers. The dancers were professionally trained with every performance choreographed; they performed the dances that our students enjoy and do themselves. The gentleman and the lady who sang had beautiful voices. The songs were popular songs with some of the words changed to fit the anti-bullying theme of the program. Mrs. Paige-Cain even mentioned that the male singer had been bullied, and that she had been bullied when she weighed 300 pounds.

It seemed as though the video was one of the most thought-provoking parts of the program. The video included a father whose son committed suicide because he was bullied. The pictures of other students who had committed suicide were shown; they, too, had been bullied.

Thurgood Marshall Middle School recently had the opportunity to host The Evolve Project, who presented an anti-bullying presentation to our entire student body. The program was very interactive with singers and dancers. They definitely had all eight hundred students engaged for the entire assembly...which is no easy task! The antibullying message was student-friendly with real world people who had been bullied, showing how it affected them and their families. During the stories and videos, there were tears in the audience as the students listened to the families who lost children to suicide. The presentation was very professional. It was a pleasure to work with them. They encouraged our students to go to their Facebook page and like The Evolve Project and give them feedback. They even followed up with the administration on one of our female students that had gone to the website and posted information about being bullied and previous thoughts of suicide. I appreciated having that information. After the presentation, they emailed a School Climate Student Questionnaire and Post Survey to administer to our student body to see hear how safe they feel and the climate of the school. We will use this information to make decisions about the school, its climate, and culture. In the days that followed the presentation, I saw several of our teachers talking about the presentation on social media sites stating that it was by far the best assembly they had ever attended.
